Parking, snow reminders

Residents are reminded of the winter parking ordinance, which prohibits parking on city streets after a 2-inch snowfall, until the street has been plowed curb-to-curb. Violators may be tagged and towed. Plymouth also has a year-round ordinance that prohibits parking on city streets 2-5 a.m. Visit plymouthmn.gov/snow to track snowplows on the Live Plymouth Plow Map, report issues, sign up for snow emergency alert emails and texts, and view more information about snow removal in Plymouth.



Adopt a Fire Hydrant


The Plymouth Fire Department asks residents to shovel a 3-foot radius around fire hydrants after a snowfall. Quick access to hydrants is crucial during a fire, as a fire engine's water supply depletes rapidly. Shoveling around hydrants allows first responders to gain access to water faster during a fire and eliminates the need for firefighters to dig a hydrant out of the snow before it can be used during an emergency situation. Water service line survey

Due to requirements from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the City of Plymouth asks residents to participate in a water service line material survey. The survey can be completed by scanning the QR code above, or by visiting plymouthmn.gov/serviceline. The survey asks residents to upload a photo of their service line (typically located below the water meter). The service line inventory is required for the Revised Lead and Copper Rule put in place by the EPA. For more information about the rule, visit epa.gov.

The City of Plymouth is preparing for the 2024 election season, beginning with the Presidential Nomination Primary Election set for Tuesday, March 5.

In the Presidential Nomination Primary Election, voters will cast their vote for a presidential candidate to appear on the general election ballot in November.

Voters without internet access can call 763-509-5000 for more information. By law, only major parties may participate in the Presidential Nomination Primary Election. The major parties in Minnesota that are eligible to participate in the nomination election are Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party, Legal Marijuana Now Party and Republican Party of Minnesota.

Plymouth destination marketing organization coming soon

Attracting visitors to dine, shop, stay and play in Plymouth will soon be a full-time job. The City of Plymouth is set to launch a new destination marketing organization (DMO) in 2024.

Similar to a convention and visitors bureau, Plymouth's DMO will be tasked with promoting the city as a destination for high-quality tourism and visitor experiences.

Funded by the city's lodging tax, which is collected during hotel stays as part of the tax to rent a room, the DMO will function as an internal organization operating out of the Parks and Recreation Department.

"Travel and tourism enhance quality of life," said Parks and Recreation Director Jennifer Tomlinson.

"Attracting people to Plymouth will help provide jobs, boost local spending, and will bring more

restaurants, shops, festivals, and cultural and sporting events to Plymouth."

At press time, following a request-for-proposals process, the city was finalizing a contract with a Minnesota-based advertising agency to develop a new name and brand for the DMO. The new brand will be announced later in 2024.



The DMO is geared towards attracting visitors to Plymouth and is funded by the city's lodging tax, which is collected during hotel stays when visitors rent a room.

Additionally, the city is set to hire a new full-time DMO coordinator in early 2024 to oversee marketing and public relations for the DMO; develop relationships with community partners and businesses; oversee visitor services; and promote local events, activities, dining options and more to attract visitors to Plymouth. The DMO will have oversight from a City Council-appointed board made up of Plymouth business representatives and city staff members.

Plymouth joins Just Deeds to help property owners remove discriminatory covenants

The City of Plymouth recently joined the Just Deeds coalition, which enables Plymouth residents to remove discriminatory covenants from property deeds at no cost to the property owner. Plymouth City Council passed a resolution for the city to participate in Just Deeds at its Oct. 24 meeting.

Just Deeds is a group of real estate professionals, lawyers, advocates and community members in Minnesota working together to acknowledge and address systemic racism in housing. In the early 20th century, real estate developers included discriminatory covenants in deeds to prevent a property from being sold, leased or occupied based on race, religion or ethnicity. Although legally unenforceable following the Fair Housing Act of 1968, many of these covenants remain on deeds today.

According to data by Mapping Prejudice, a University of Minnesota research project, there are more than 24,000

racial covenants included in property deeds in Hennepin County, including 245 in Plymouth. In November, the City of Plymouth mailed postcards to the properties identified with information about Just Deeds and how to begin the free process of discharging the covenant.

The process adds a statement to the property title that rejects the language of the discriminatory covenant.

"The presence of discriminatory covenants in property deeds conflicts with one of Plymouth's top priorities – to remain a city of choice that offers high-quality, cost-effective, equitable and inclusive policies and services," said Plymouth Organizational Development and Equity Partner Paul Johnson. "Removing these covenants will help create a more welcoming community for all."

Adaptive swim lessons are geared toward participants ages 5 and older who are on the autism spectrum or experience anxiety, physical disabilities, sensory sensitivities and more. Semi-private adaptive swim lessons are also available.

Private Pool Rental/Birthday Parties

Plymouth also offers the opportunity to hold a pool party. The pool may be rented privately for a minimum of two hours for up to 100 attendees.

Party packages are available, featuring mermaid, shark, pirate, tropical or glow-in-the-dark themes.

Water Exercise

A variety of no- to low-impact exercise classes are available to swimmers ages 16 and older. Offerings include deep water running, deep water cardio and aquafusion flow.

Specialty Classes/Events

Register for specialty classes to become a certified American Red Cross swim instructor or lifeguard. Special swim events for youth are also available, including a shark tank social, party like a mermaid, tropical party and glow-in-the-dark pool party.

Drop-In Swim Activities

Drop-in swimming activities are available during select hours Monday through Friday and some weekends. Drop-in swim programs include lap swim, open swim, water walking, sensory swim and more.

IN BRIEF

Plymouth Adopts 2024 Budget – The Plymouth City Council has adopted the 2024 budget, which includes an overall property tax levy increase of 7.5% from 2023. A variety of factors have affected budgeting for 2024, including legislative impacts, inflation, personnel costs, capital needs, special revenue funds and other expenses.

The levy increase is consistent with recent budgets and includes the final of three scheduled levy increases related to debt issued for reconstruction of Fire Stations 2 and 3. Plymouth's continued growth in tax base helps reduce the impact of the levy, as does employing financial strategies like paying off debt early.

For the average homeowner in Plymouth, the tax levy increase is estimated to have an annual impact of \$57.45 on a \$470,000 home. Plymouth utilizes long-range financial planning tools that help avoid spikes in the tax levy as new development slows, which allows the city to maintain a stable tax rate for residential and commercial properties.

Detailed information about the city budget, including the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report and other documents that outline the city's financial status and practices, is available at plymouthmn.gov/financialreport.

Tree Trimming – Each year, the City of Plymouth hires a Tree Care Industry Association-accredited tree service to prune boulevard and park trees.

Ostvig Tree, Inc. will trim boulevard trees for street clearance and removal of hazardous and/or dead limbs. Trimming begins in February and is expected to last through March or April – focusing on the northeastern area of Plymouth.




Annual trimming of city boulevard and park trees is set to occur in the northeastern part of the city this year.

Residents who trim their own boulevard trees should contact City Forester Paul Buck at 763-509-5944 or pbuck@plymouthmn.gov so they can be noted in the tree inventory. Pruning of private trees is the responsibility of the respective property owners. Pruning is recommended during dormancy, typically November through March, to avoid potential pest and disease problems.

The city recommends residents utilize companies that have certified arborists on staff, as well as adequate insurance.

Sign up for weekly curbside organics collection

The city's recycling contractor, Republic Services, will now offer weekly curbside organics collection to all Plymouth households beginning in March 2024.

All households pay for organics recycling through their utility bill, like regular recycling. Residents must sign up to receive an organics cart to get started. Those who sign up by Thursday, Feb. 15 will receive their carts in late February. To sign up, visit plymouthmn.gov/organics.

Background

Due to state law and county mandate, all Plymouth residents will be charged for curbside organics collection in 2024. Following a community engagement initiative that largely supported city-led organized organics collection (including food scraps and other

compostable materials), the Plymouth City Council approved a contract extension with Republic Services to add curbside organics.

Collection Schedule

While curbside organics will be collected weekly, singlesort recycling collection (plastics, metals, cardboard, etc.) will continue every other week. For those who sign up, weekly organics collection will take place the same day as garbage/recycling day. View the gray/blue recycling map at plymouthmn.gov/recyclingschedule for details.

When voting, residents must choose which major party's ballot they want, and only presidential candidates will appear on the ballot.

The party that voters chose to vote for will not be public information. However, the chair of each major political party will be provided a list of voters who selected that party.

Voting Options

For the Presidential Nomination Primary Election, voters have options for casting their ballot, including in person, by absentee, via mail and through direct ballot.

- On the day of the election: Polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on the day of the Presidential Nomination Primary Election, Tuesday, March 5. Find polling locations at mnvotes.org.
- Early voting/absentee ballots: Voters can vote early at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Blvd., beginning Jan. 19 through 5 p.m. March 4.

Plymouth City Hall is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday for early voting. In addition, there will be extended hours on Saturday, March 2 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Voters can also receive an absentee ballot through the mail. To do so, apply online at the Minnesota Secretary of State's website at mnvotes.org.

• Direct ballot: Another option, direct balloting (feeding the ballot through the tabulator) can be completed at Plymouth City Hall 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Feb. 16 through March 1; 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, March 2; and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday, March 4.

Following the Presidential Nomination Primary Election, future election dates in Minnesota are:

- State Primary Election Day: Tuesday, Aug. 13
- General Election Day: Tuesday, Nov. 5

Smart Salting demonstrates commitment to environment

Despite the unseasonably warm start to winter, snow will undoubtedly make an appearance and, along with it, so will Plymouth's commitment to Smart Salting.

A Minnesota Pollution Control Agency training program, Smart Salting is pretty much how it sounds – Plymouth snowplow crews continually make adjustments to operations to more effectively apply salt and reduce overall use without compromising safety. The MPCA recently spotlighted Plymouth as a role model for salting practices.

Salt has major environmental impacts. According to MPCA, road salt used for deicing is the largest source of chloride pollution in the state. Salt makes its way into lakes, streams and rivers, and can be toxic to fish and other aquatic inhabitants.

Plymouth has been making incremental changes for years – and has decreased overall salt use by about 40% in the last decade. Crews use anti-icing units to pretreat all roads over 35 mph, which halves the amount of salt used per lane mile. Snowplows are also equipped with prewetting systems to help the solution cling to the road instead of bouncing off like dry salt granules, significantly reducing salt use. The city's automated brine maker can produce about 5,000 gallons per hour, used for pretreating and plowing.

Some of Plymouth's other strategies include calibrating truck spreaders and anti-ice units twice annually, promptly sweeping spills, storing road salt in a covered building to prevent runoff, using GPS to track salt application rates and sending all 27 city snowplow drivers to Smart Salting training.

These practices align with one of Plymouth's strategic themes – environmental stewardship. If we ever get snow this winter, we can take comfort knowing that snowplow crews are working hard to keep us safe on the roads while doing all they can to protect our precious natural resources.
