

Drinking Water Report

Published each June, the City of Plymouth annual drinking water report is now available to view online. Like past years, Plymouth's water met or surpassed all 2023 state and federal water quality testing, regulations and requirements. The report contains monitoring results from previous year(s).

City of Plymouth water is tested weekly by an independent, state-certified laboratory. Results are submitted to the Minnesota Department of Health. Plymouth's water is regularly tested for more than 100 contaminants, such as bacteria, nitrates, pesticides, solvents and metals. Water is also tested multiple times per day for appropriate chemical levels and water quality. View the report at plymouthmn.gov/waterreport.

The public may download the water report, or request a paper copy by calling 763-509-5000 and arranging to pick it up during normal business hours (8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday) at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Blvd.

Presented by the Plymouth Civic League and City of Plymouth, the event begins at 5:30 p.m. and offers food, fun and entertainment – featuring a performance by the Minnesota Orchestra.

Music in Plymouth Lineup

Access for Music in Plymouth/Primary Voting

Plymouth Boulevard between Highway 55 and Rockford Road is under construction this summer (see article below). City Hall and the Hilde Performance Center will remain accessible throughout all phases of construction, though detours may impact available routes. Prior to voting or attending events, check plymouthmn.gov/plymouthblvd.

Statewide primary election set for Aug. 13

The 2024 statewide primary election is set for Tuesday, Aug. 13. Polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. In the primary, Plymouth voters narrow the field of candidates for U.S. Senator. Top vote getters will move on to the Tuesday, Nov. 5 general election. Plymouth City Council seats (see page 2 for council filing information) will be on the November ballot, but are not included in the primary.

poll location finder. Voters without internet access can call 763-509-5000 for more information.

Voter Registration

While registration may be completed in person the day of the primary, those new to voting, who have changed their name or who moved since the last election can save time by pre-registering to vote. Tuesday, July 23 is the deadline to pre-register for the primary election.

City offers summer road construction recap

A number of significant road construction projects may impact motorists in Plymouth this summer. Community members may visit the links below to stay up to date.

Drivers are reminded to slow down, be cautious, allow for extra commute times and follow all construction signage. The city appreciates the public's patience. Please note that construction timelines are weather dependent and are subject to change.

- Highway 55 The Minnesota Department of
 Transportation has begun the Highway 55 pavement
 improvement project from Old Rockford Road in
 Plymouth to General Mills Boulevard in Golden Valley.
 This work involves lane reductions, directional closures
 and short-term intersection closures throughout the

- Plymouth Boulevard Plymouth Boulevard is undergoing major improvements between Highway 55 and Rockford Road (County Road 9). The project will add roundabouts, improve crossings for pedestrian safety, upgrade trail connectivity and more. More information: plymouthmn.gov/plymouthblvd

Plymouth achieves the next level in GreenStep Cities program

Since joining the GreenStep Cities initiative in 2023, the City of Plymouth has steadily advanced within the program, and recently reached Step 2 of the five-step recognition system.

GreenStep Cities features steps that are achieved through implementing some of the 29 GreenStep best practices, which are categorized into land use, buildings and lighting, transportation, environmental management, and resilient economic and community development.

In the organization's Assessment 2025 of the City of Plymouth, GreenStep Cities listed notable sustainability actions in the city such as:

- Plymouth Community Center Remodeled and expanded in 2022, following Minnesota B3 Guidelines and Sustainable Building 2030 (SB2030) energy standards through construction and post-construction monitoring.
- City-operated transit service, Plymouth Metrolink – Provides express bus, reverse commute, and on-demand Click-and-Ride services.
- Tree City USA Plymouth has been a certified community for 39 years.
- Plymouth City Center Planning and design standards in place to cultivate a walkable, vibrant and pedestrian-friendly downtown.
- "Adopt a Spot" programs Promote cleaning and maintenance of city gardens, parks, dog waste stations, fire hydrants, storm drains and streets.

"We're proud to achieve Step 2 – it recognizes our continued focus on environmental stewardship," Plymouth Public Works Director Michael Thompson said. "Much

of our practices throughout the years have aligned with GreenStep Cities, and the program helps us organize and streamline our initiatives. We have already made great progress on Step 3 as well."

An Environmentally Conscious Community

Though Plymouth officially joined the initiative in 2023, the city has long adopted a number of best practices and has a history of making environmentally driven decisions in development. In addition to ongoing initiatives supported by the Environmental Quality Committee, the focus and work around sustainability was further increased last year when the City Council adopted Environmental Stewardship as one of its strategic themes, which was designed to examine the city's impact and commitment to stewardship.

Used Oil Drop-Off at the Maintenance Facility – A free, 24-hour drop-off site for used motor oil, antifreeze and oil filters is available at the Plymouth Maintenance Facility, 14900 23rd Ave. N., adjacent to the fuel pumps. Do not leave empty containers. Residents using the site should read and follow all posted instructions to prevent contamination.

The city's vendor, East Side Oil, provides reprocessing that turns the waste product into fuel for heaters and asphalt plants.

Plymouth Environmental Academy – Those interested in learning more about their environmental footprint may sign up for the Plymouth Environmental Academy, which returns for its fourth year. The program is an initiative of the city's Environmental Quality Committee.

The academy spans four months with a class each month focused on an environmental topic of interest. The Plymouth Environmental Academy is free and open to everyone – but participants must fill out an application to attend. To apply, visit plymouthmn.gov/environmentalacademy. Applications are due Thursday, Aug. 15.

Electric vehicle charging stations available citywide

The city's network of electric vehicle charging stations is now fully operational – and available for community use at a variety of public parking lots and park and ride locations in Plymouth.

The city partnered with Carbon Solutions Group to implement EV charging stations in fall of 2021. After a series of material shortages and shipping delays, installation of all 115 charging stalls has been completed across 13 locations in Plymouth.

As part of the agreement, CSG funds capital and operational costs for the EV charging stations at no cost to Plymouth taxpayers. Users pay a fee to utilize the chargers.

The charging stations, which offer L-2, 24kW and 180kW chargers, are available at locations such as the as Plymouth Community Center, Northwest Greenway Pavilion, Parkers Lake Park, Station 73 and more.



Through a partnership with CSG, the City of Plymouth offers 115 EV charging stalls across 13 locations in Plymouth.

New Highway 169 noise walls slated for Plymouth

The Minnesota Department of Transportation recently announced plans to construct a new noise wall in Plymouth on the west side of Highway 169, between 26th Avenue N. and 17th Avenue N. with construction potentially starting summer of 2028.

The City of Plymouth applied for the project beginning in 2018 to mitigate traffic noise as part of MnDOT's Standalone Noise Barrier Program. Per the cost sharing

program, Plymouth will pay 10% of the project cost, with MnDOT covering the remaining 90% – which is roughly \$7 million.

"This is exciting news, and something that we've been working towards for about six years," said Plymouth Public Works Director Michael Thompson. "This will be a big benefit for Plymouth residents in the area and provide separation from the traffic and noise of Highway 169."

Filing for City Council opens July 30

The filing period for City Council seats in the upcoming general election begins Tuesday, July 30. The deadline to file is 5 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 13. Filing can be completed with the city clerk during normal business hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Blvd.

Construction notice: Please note that access to City Hall may be detoured due to construction on Plymouth Boulevard. For project information and to view details, visit plymouthmn.gov/plymouthblvd.

The four-year term city seats that will be on the Nov. 5 ballot include Ward 1 council member (northwest Plymouth), Ward 3 council member (southeast Plymouth) and an At-Large council member.

To file for office, candidates must be eligible to vote and at least 21 years old by the time they take office. Candidates must live in the district for which they are running for at least 30 days before the election. The filing fee is \$5. History in the making: Old Town Hall reopens Aug. 3

After shuttering doors to the building many have referred to as Plymouth's history museum, the City of Plymouth is set to reopen the Plymouth Old Town Hall in August. Adjacent to Plymouth Creek Park, the building sits at 3605 Fernbrook Lane N.

The Plymouth History Center experienced a multi-year closure that resulted from a burst water pipe in the basement during the pandemic.

During that time, staff have been working to make repairs, reorganize and catalogue items, reimagine programming and give the interior a makeover.

Built in 1885 as the town's municipal building, the refreshed Old Town Hall is set to showcase new exhibits; a research room to browse old newspapers, yearbooks and documents; audio recording space for oral history projects; photos; historical models; a timeline of the city's history and more.

The community is invited to an open house 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 3 at Plymouth Old Town Hall to celebrate the reopening of the building.

All are welcome to stop by, and no RSVP is required. Light refreshments will be provided, while supplies last.

"We've spent the last few years gathering thousands of historical materials to bring new life to past artifacts," said Historical Site Coordinator Ryan Barland. "Whether you have lived in Plymouth your whole life, are a new resident, or a general history buff, there is something for everyone to enjoy. You might be surprised at what you'll uncover."

Parks and Recreation supervisor achieves National Inclusion Project certification

As the City of Plymouth has steadily bolstered its offering of inclusive and adaptive recreation programs, one city staff member recently earned new credentials – certification from the National Inclusion Project as an Inclusive Recreation Specialist.

Parks and Recreation Supervisor Paul Pearson achieved the certification following completion of the nonprofit organization's 16-week inclusive recreation specialist course.

With the goal of making "the inclusion of children with disabilities the expectation, not the exception," the National Inclusion Project certification signifies that Pearson has been trained to comprehensively meet the needs of children with disabilities in recreational settings.

Pearson said he was proud to achieve the certification and looks forward to enhancing programming so that Plymouth can be as inclusive and welcoming as possible.

"I feel better equipped to offer programs that serve individuals based on their needs," said Pearson, an eight-year veteran of the Parks and Recreation Department. "We realized we have a need for more recreation opportunities from community members who have children with disabilities, so our focus has been meeting those needs."

The city began offering a compilation of inclusive and adaptive recreation programs in recent years, and recreation staff have continued to build on those offerings. Programs have included Sensory Friendly Sundays at the K.U.B.E., adaptive aquatics and inclusive fitness classes, as well as events such as Santa Visits the Sensory Room, Dialed Down Disco and more. The city also puts emphasis on adaptability and inclusion when developing and updating parks and trails.

Absentee (Early) Voting Available

Residents who wish to vote early by absentee ballot can do so in person, by ballot dropoff or by mail.

The entire absentee balloting (early voting) process can be completed in person Friday, June 28 through Monday, Aug. 12 at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Blvd. To vote early in person, voters must fill out an application and will be issued a ballot on site.

Voters may also apply to receive a ballot through the mail and drop it off at Plymouth City Hall. Absentee (early voting) ballots must be received by 8 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 13. To apply for a mail ballot and learn more about the process, visit mnvotes.org.

Vote by Direct Ballot

Direct balloting allows residents to vote in person via absentee ballot and place their ballots through a tabulator (just like on the day of the election). This process is available at Plymouth City Hall Friday, July 26 to Monday, Aug. 12.

Outdoor Water Restrictions - Outdoor water use restrictions are in effect from May through September for all city water customers. Plymouth prohibits outdoor lawn watering from noon to 5 p.m. on all days. Residents and businesses must also follow an odd-even schedule when sprinkling lawns - addresses ending in an odd number may water on odd-numbered calendar days, while addresses ending in an even number may water on even-numbered days. Yard Waste Site Hours - The city-operated Yard Waste Site, 14900 23rd Ave. N., is closed Mondays and Tuesdays. The site is open 3-8 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday-Sunday. Hours of operation change in September. Only Plymouth, Wayzata, Long Lake and Medicine Lake residents may use the site. Identification is required. 
