



## Annual drinking water report now available online

Published each June, the City of Plymouth annual drinking water report is now available to view online. Like past years, Plymouth's water met or surpassed all 2024 state and federal water quality testing, regulations and requirements. The report contains monitoring results from previous year(s).

City of Plymouth water is tested weekly by an independent, state-certified laboratory. Results are submitted to the Minnesota Department of Health. Plymouth's water is regularly tested for more than 100 contaminants, such as bacteria, nitrates, pesticides, solvents and metals. Water is also tested multiple times per day for appropriate chemical levels and water quality. View the report at [plymouthmn.gov/waterreport](http://plymouthmn.gov/waterreport).

## Community survey slated for mailboxes later this year

To collect community feedback and gauge city service satisfaction, the City of Plymouth is set to conduct a community survey later this year.

In the coming months, residents may receive a randomized mailed survey to complete, which asks questions regarding quality of life, public safety, customer satisfaction and more. Those who receive the mailing are asked to complete it following the instructions included. Those who do not receive the mailing will have the opportunity to complete the survey online. ## The Station 73 TRIP project is underway on Highway 55

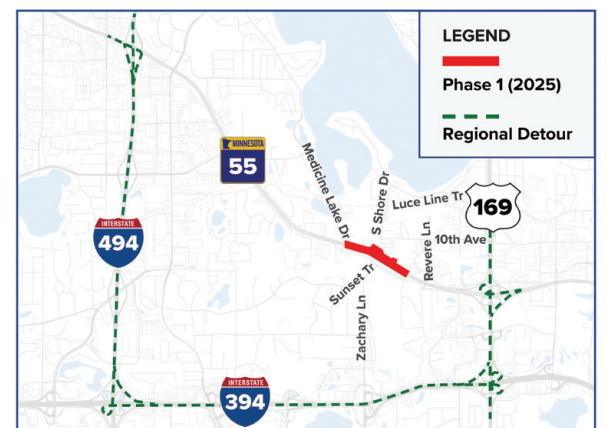
The area around Highway 55 and County Road 73 in Plymouth is set to undergo a major transformation as the Station 73 TRIP project continues.

Highway 55 closed in both directions between Revere Lane and West Medicine Lake Boulevard in mid-June and is set to reopen this fall.

Motorists traveling through the area have been detoured to Interstate 494, Interstate 394 and Highway 169. Access to adjacent businesses and residential areas has been maintained – residents and local traffic may use service roads and alternate routes where necessary.

The City of Plymouth has partnered with Hennepin County, Three Rivers Park District, the Metropolitan Council and the Minnesota Department of Transportation to complete the project, which is slated to continue through fall 2026.

As the project progresses, lane closures, full closures and detours may continue to occur. The Station 73 TRIP project includes regionally impactful improvements that will increase safety and mobility for pedestrians, bicyclists, motorists and transit users.

# Hennepin County Sheriff’s Office opens new facility in Plymouth

The Hennepin County Sheriff’s Office recently cut the ribbon at its new Public Safety Services Headquarters near Parkers Lake in Plymouth, at 1345 Shenandoah Lane N. Located next to the existing County Adult Corrections Facility, the new 100,000-square-foot facility houses the Enforcement Division, armory and storage for more than 115 vehicles. The new facility in Plymouth replaces the former Enforcement Division building in Brooklyn Park. Due to the new location, Plymouth residents may notice an increase in Sheriff’s Office vehicles in the city as they travel to various locations around the county with Plymouth as the center of operations. While the move to Plymouth will increase visibility of county law enforcement, the



The new facility houses the county's Enforcement Division, armory and storage for more than 115 vehicles. Plymouth Police Department remains the agency in charge of patrolling the city.

## City of Plymouth provides safety reminders, laws for ebike users

As the use of electric-assisted bikes (ebikes) increases, the City of Plymouth reminds riders to prioritize safety, use good trail etiquette, and stay informed about laws and guidelines. According to Minnesota State Statute 169.222, ebikes can typically be used wherever traditional bikes are allowed, as long as they meet the following requirements:

- Must have two or three wheels, a saddle (seat) and fully operable pedals
- Riders must be age 15 or older to operate an ebike
- Must meet one of the following electric-assist bicycle class requirements:
  - o Class 1 – An electric assist up to 20 mph with no throttle
  - o Class 2 – An electric assist up to 20 mph with a throttle
  - o Class 3 – An electric assist up to 28 mph with no throttle
- Electric motors must be 750 watts or less

- Riders may not modify an ebike to change the speed capability/speed limit control so that it no longer meets its labeled class requirements

Below are a few other general reminders for ebike users:

- Use safe speeds – slow down around curves and hills
- Yield to other trail users – slow down when approaching others, and give pedestrians and slower trail users the right of way, especially in crosswalks
- Practice good trail etiquette – Always pass on the left and give an audible signal (e.g., “Passing on your left!”) prior to passing
- Wear a bicycle helmet and other safety gear

“Many of our trails were designed for slower speeds, and have hills and curves that limit visibility for ebike users traveling at faster speeds,” said Plymouth Public Safety Director Erik Fadden. “In addition to bikers, our trails are used by walkers, runners, little kids on scooters and bikes, people with dogs, and parents pushing baby strollers. We’re asking ebike riders to slow down and practice good trail etiquette to ensure the trails are safer for all users.”

### Reserving Spots, Free Shuttle

Due to extensive underground wiring and sprinkling systems at the Hilde, staking and roping off seating areas is strictly prohibited. Those attending Music in Plymouth may not place blankets, chairs or tarps on the grounds until after 7 a.m. the morning of the event. Clear tarps are not permitted as they may burn the grass. Plymouth Metrolink will shuttle attendees to the event at no cost from two park-and-ride locations – Wayzata High School (4955 Peony Lane N.) and the Plymouth Community Center (14800 34th Ave. N.). ## Plymouth offers opportunity for youth to ‘explore’ careers in law enforcement

The Plymouth Police Department is accepting applications for Police Explorers – a program that offers youth ages 14 to 20 an opportunity to explore a career in law enforcement while gaining hands-on experience and professional mentorship. Participants receive instruction from active Plymouth police officers and get an inside look at the responsibilities, challenges and decision-making involved in police work. The program includes both classroom learning and practical exercises in areas such as domestic intervention, crime scene search, crash investigation, hostage negotiation, traffic stops

and more. Explorers also learn essential skills like first aid, firearm safety and crime prevention. Participants meet weekly during the school year at the Plymouth Public Safety Building, 3400 Plymouth Blvd., and are expected to maintain consistent attendance. Explorers may also participate in summer activities. Applications are accepted year-round; most new members start in September. 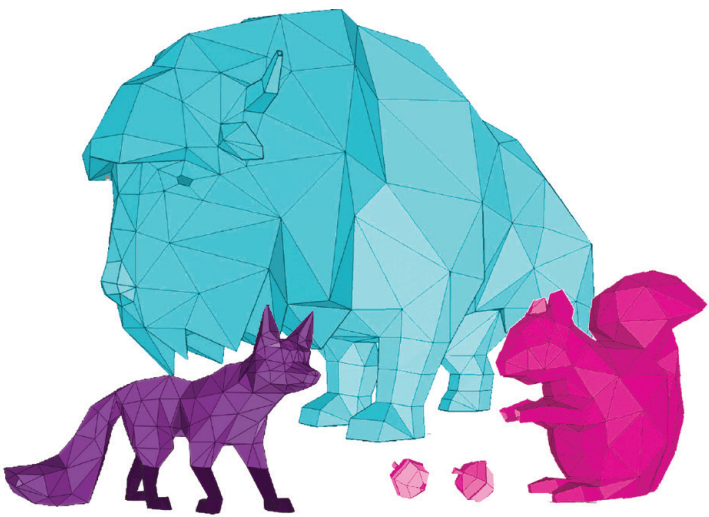

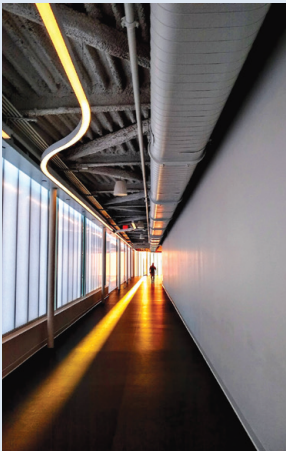

Do not leave empty containers. Residents using the site should read and follow all posted instructions to prevent contamination. The city’s vendor, East Side Oil, provides reprocessing that turns the waste product into fuel for heaters and asphalt plants. **Plymouth Environmental Academy** – Those interested in learning more about their environmental footprint may sign up for the Plymouth Environmental Academy, which returns for its fifth year. The program is an initiative of the city’s Environmental Quality Committee. The academy is held August through October and will focus on a variety of environmental topics. 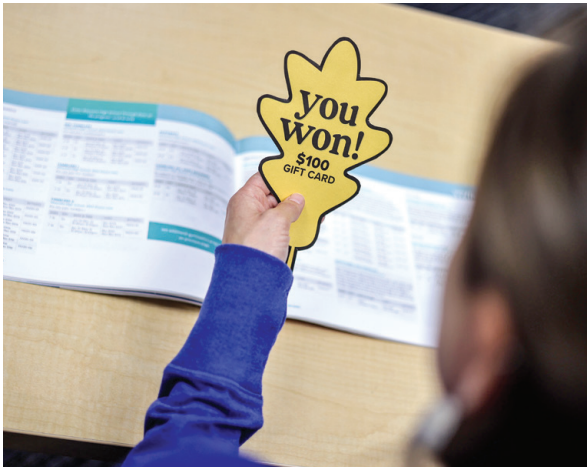

Outdoor water use restrictions are in effect from May through September in Plymouth.

**Outdoor Water Use Restrictions** – Outdoor water use restrictions are in effect from May through September for all city water customers.

Plymouth prohibits outdoor lawn watering from noon to 5 p.m. on all days. Residents and businesses must also follow an odd-even schedule when sprinkling lawns – addresses ending in an odd number may water on odd-numbered calendar days, while addresses ending in an even number may water on even-numbered days. Automatic irrigation systems should be adjusted accordingly.

**Yard Waste Site Hours** – The city-operated Yard Waste Site, 14900 23rd Ave. N., is open 3-8 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday-Sunday.

Hours of operation change in September. The site is closed Mondays and Tuesdays throughout the season. Only Plymouth, Wayzata, Long Lake and Medicine Lake residents may use the site.

## Smart Tree Inventory scanning begins in July

Scanning of public trees citywide, specifically those within the boulevards and rights-of-way, is slated to begin in late-July as part of the city’s Smart Tree Inventory project.

Smart Tree Inventory utilizes artificial intelligence and LiDAR, laser pulses that measure distances and create high-resolution 3D maps, to take a digital inventory of all public trees in the city.

Expected to take about two weeks to complete, scanning will involve crews traveling around Plymouth in vehicles mounted with sensors that detect and analyze tree size, condition, canopy volume and health. The software will provide assessments, including eco-benefits, and allow city staff to compare data over time to measure tree growth and other changes.

In partnership with Davey Resource Group and Greehill, Smart Tree Inventory helps preserve trees, maintain property values and diversify the city’s urban forest.

## Remembering Police Chief Mike Goldstein

Our community lost a remarkable leader and friend with the unexpected passing of retired Public Safety Director/Police Chief Mike Goldstein on May 20. His legacy is one of unwavering service, deep compassion and profound impact. Mike retired in 2021 following a landmark career in Plymouth that spanned more than three decades. Raised in Plymouth, he devoted nearly his entire professional life to the city. Mike joined Plymouth’s first class of Police Explorers as a high schooler in 1984, and went on to be a part of the first group of Plymouth Police Reserves. In 1990, Mike was hired as a full-time sworn officer with the Plymouth Police Department. He was promoted to sergeant in 1994, lieutenant in 2001, captain in 2003, police chief in 2004 and was named the city’s public safety director in 2015, when the Police and Fire departments joined under one umbrella.

His leadership shaped our approach to public safety and strengthened community trust. Under his guidance, Plymouth became a statewide leader in emergency operations planning, prioritizing officer mental health and wellness, and community-oriented policing. Mike led with integrity, humility and heart. He was a true servant-leader who ensured those around him felt seen, valued and respected.

Mike had a gift for connection. Whether visiting neighborhoods during Night to Unite, meeting with community groups, mentoring staff, or collaborating with fellow chiefs, he built lasting relationships. His calm, people-first approach brought stability and clarity during difficult moments. His strong leadership earned him statewide recognition and respect. Beyond the badge, Mike was a devoted husband, father, son, brother and friend. We mourn his loss alongside his family, colleagues and many others who were lucky enough to know him. Mike made us better, and his legacy lives on through the lives he touched. We are grateful for his service, and we will miss him dearly.
